State Planning Issues

1. Will you commit to ensuring there is statutory recognition and protection of the existing regional inter-urban break, between the Sunshine Coast and Moreton Bay Regional Councils (including Halls Creek)?

I recognise the importance of maintaining the inter-urban break.

This green corridor is vital for biodiversity to have protection.

Sunshine Coast residents and tourists value the unique green spaces that are a feature of the Sunshine Coast. The inter-urban break/green space is a vital contributor to the sense of character and connection with nature that we all enjoy.

2. (a). Will you support the Blue Heart project on 5000 ha of the Maroochy floodplain as a critical response to climate change?

Blue Heart is vital to the survival of the ecosystem and world renown biosphere of the region.

The Blue Heart enables natural drainage systems. Without the Blue Heart, at times of floods, there would be an increased risk to the coastal residents and infrastructure.

The Blue Heart is therefore an insurance policy that we should all invest in, as we face a climate emergency.

(b) Will you ensure that funding from the State's Land Restoration Program is continued and is available to landowners within the Maroochy floodplain?

Yes. I would work in consultation with the residents and environmental scientists to support systems that protect life and the ecosystem.

3. As the Planning Act includes forms of planning and development that fall within the scope of "development" in the Economic Development Act, if elected, in the interest of consistency across state legislation, will you commit to amending the Economic Development Act to ensure that the ecological sustainability principles in Sections 3, 4 and 5 of the Planning Act are incorporated fully into the Economic Development Act and applied as intended by the Planning Act?

I fully support the importance of maintaining the natural environment, so I support this. The other missing piece is the importance of consultation with the Traditional Owners who have thousands of years of knowledge and cultural places that are not protected effectively by current Cultural Heritage legislation.

4. The State Government has established a State Facilitated Development (SFD) process to "deliver affordable housing". It allows the state to ignore and override local planning schemes, local councils and the community and removes the right of appeal to the Planning and Environment Court.

Recently the State Government declared an SFD in Noosa Shire in opposition to Noosa Shire Council, its Planning Scheme and against Community Expectations. At its September General Meeting OSCAR member groups voted unanimously that:

OSCAR calls on the Government, the Opposition, and all standing Candidates to commit to repealing the SFD legislation within 6 months and Rejecting or Suspending all current Applications/designations.

Will you commit to repealing the SFD legislation and reject or suspend all current applications/designations and undertake negations with Councils and the community.

The Miles Labor government's state facilitated development process, presented in the name of improving housing availability and affordability, is instead about overriding planning laws for the benefit of rich developers. The Greens would repeal it, reject or suspend all current applications/designations and undertake negotiations with Councils and the community.

Affordable housing should be built up using existing infrastructure. I would be pushing for areas such as Nambour and railways towns that have transport and other existing infrastructure to be prioritised to provide housing without destruction of natural habitat. Nambour would benefit from building up to 8 stories, and maintaining the green circle that provides for healthy connection with bushland and contributes to the quality of life.

I would ensure that there are restrictions about building in low lying areas that are subject to future flooding in the face of climate change. With regard to height limits for coastal developments, I would ensure neighbourhood plans involve robust democratic community consultation and are binding.

New developments must have adequate trees to provide share, avoid heat sinks, and provide a mechanism for drainage in the event of floods.

Building urban sprawl and losing bushland is something I would argue against.

Large areas of concrete contribute to greenhouse gases and create heat sinks that mean that the houses are dependent on high energy consumption.

The housing crisis has been created by the prevalence of corporate greed. I would encourage Community Land Trusts in areas that have already been cleared (eg dormant farmland).

I would also encourage systems that enable large houses to be renovated to provide multiple dwellings.

I would also encourage better opportunities for tiny houses while maintaining effective water, sewerage and green power options.

5. In relation to the finalised Sunshine Coast Airport Development Scheme finalised by EDQ on Friday 27 September 2024: will you commit to the stated objective of "no worsening for existing communities around the airport", by guaranteeing that ALL infrastructure (road and drainage) will be in place in time to manage non-aviation development impacts?

The Greens are committed to minimising the impact of flight noise and other impacts on local residents, and will always stand for the local community as an alternative to the huge incentive schemes that Labor and the LNP support for massively increased tourism.

I would consult with OSCAR and residents impacted by the scheme. Ideally, I would support all strategies to minimise the impact of air traffic. I have not had the opportunity to fully understand the impacts of future airport plans.

I would love to live in a world where we had effective alternatives to air traffic. I would need to understand more about the options, and make my decisions keeping in the mind the quality of life of residents.

6. Given the significant and diverse implications of Climate Change for this region and the State as a whole, what emissions reduction and renewable energy targets and associated timeframes do you commit to for Queensland, and what detailed plans do you have to achieve those targets?

The Queensland Greens are pushing to cut climate pollution by 75% by 2030, with net zero by 2035. We are pushing for 100% publicly-owned renewables by 2030: https://greens.org.au/qld/climate

Sunshine coast has one of the highest rates of car dependency in Australia. We need to urgently look at green transport options. Continuous noise and pollution levels from the Bruce Highway 24/7 is disturbing many residents. Developing bushland along busy roads, minimises the radiant noise.

Free and frequent public transport is one solution for major traffic flow areas.

New developments should only be allowed where low-pollution transport systems are provided for.

Let's encourage bikeways and active transport options wherever possible.

Older residents, and residents living away from major traffic routes must have access to affordable transport such as 'demand' driven electric buses using GPS coordination systems.

Shared vehicle ownership of electric vehicles in denser populated areas should also be considered. For example, Community Land Trusts or Body corporates could provide shared electric vehicles.

Social and Affordable Housing

7. What do you see are the issues underlying homelessness on the Sunshine Coast and what strategies will you implement in the next term, if elected?

We are in a housing crisis because Labor and the LNP have treated housing as a financial asset, rather than a human right and public good, for decades.

Our housing system is stacked heavily in favour of property investors and developers. The solution is more complex than just addressing the 'supply side' – when used by Labor and the LNP, this is code for concessions for developers as we have seen with state-facilitated development.

The Greens' <u>plan</u> for Queensland features some key actions that need to occur to address the housing crisis, which is impacting locally in the form of homelessness, people in extreme rental stress, and people being priced out of the Sunshine Coast and being forced to move away from their community and supports.

We need to <u>freeze rents and guarantee lease renewals</u>, to give renters stability in their homes.

We need a <u>public property developer to build 100,000 public homes</u>. This government's overreliance on the community housing sector to deliver housing has failed. There are barely any more social homes now than there were in 2015, and not a single new dwelling is on track to be built under the Housing Investment Fund, which was announced in 2021, before the election.

We need to <u>expand QBuild</u> to boost state construction capacity.

8. How will you seek to facilitate greater availability of affordable housing and improve the abysmally low amount of social housing on the Sunshine Coast?

We need a <u>public property developer to build 100,000 public homes</u>. This government's overreliance on the community housing sector to deliver housing has failed. There are barely any more social homes now than there were in 2015, and not a single new dwelling is on track to be built under the Housing Investment Fund, which was announced in 2021, before the election.

Our social housing register has tens of thousands of families waiting for homes. This is just not good enough.

We also need measures like an empty homes levy, inclusionary zoning requiring social housing as a condition of development and an intervention on Airbnb and other short-stay accommodation, which competes with local families for access to housing.

Infrastructure

9. The delivery cost and capacity of the proposed Direct Rail Project are publicly debated between parties.

a) By 2032, how far are you committing for the direct heavy rail line to go, and where will the stations be located?

The priority must be for fast, frequent and free transport along the existing rail line from Gympie to Brisbane. This is taking too long.

I would consult with residents, the Department of Transport and Main Roads, OSCAR and SCEC for advice on the details of the proposal.

b) How can we be confident that you can deliver this project in time and on budget?

The chances of any project completing on time and on budget in today's international economic environment has been challenging around the world.

We need an effective business plan, taking a wide range of factors that need to be completed before making a commitment of this kind to my constituents. I would always promise to be transparent, including the of use reliable project management and business planning that is open to scrutiny.

The Greens' plan for free and frequent public transport is <u>here</u>. We will fund a \$4 billion expansion of the public transport system, funded by taxing big mining corporations fairly.

10. Will you commit to reviewing Public Transport timetables for the Sunshine Coast from the hinterland to the Nambour Hospital, Sunshine Coast Airport, Peregian Springs and other locations across the Coast currently with hourly services?

Yes. Residents must have effective transport, particularly to hospitals and shopping centres.

Under the Greens' <u>plan</u>, we will double the number of high-frequency buses on the Sunshine Coast.

11. Will you commit to ensuring that Active Transport is provided progressively across the Sunshine Coast and, in particular, will you campaign for State funding for the Nambour to Coolum Trail and the Mapleton to Maleny trail as a landmark Olympics Legacy projects for the Sunshine Coast?

Yes, active transport is a key policy for the Greens. I would commit to both these attractive proposals, once informed by a thorough costing study.

12. Do you agree that heritage, natural environment, cultural values and the values of the Sunshine Coast and Noosa Biosphere designations must be acknowledged, respected and taken into account in any major new infrastructure projects to protect the character of our villages and towns and unique fauna, for example, fauna friendly underpasses/overpasses?

Yes. I am also deeply disturbed by the lack of protection for First Nations Cultural Heritage, and I would make protecting Kabi Kabi and Jinibara heritage a key priority, and ensure that both Queensland Government and SCC maintain a Duty of Care for Aboriginal Cultural Heritage and work with the Kabi Kabi Peoples Corp to protect that natural heritage of our regions.

Every day, Kabi Kabi people see the destruction of their ancestral heritage; it is possible to develop land respectfully. Our First Nations peoples have an intrinsic knowledge of the natural heritage and passed down knowledge about keeping balance.

13. Seqwater's Water Security Program 2023 (WSP2023) sets out a 30-year plan to ensure we continue to maintain high levels of water security for South East Queenslanders.

What do you feel is the best approach to ensuring water security for the Sunshine Coast given the continuing high rates of population growth and the implications of Climate Change?

I would base my decisions on consultation processes, particularly valuing the natural landscape, maintaining biodiversity, and water quality. I would revisit the strategy of residential water tanks and learn what are the barriers to encouraging all houses to have self managed water reserves. Effective waste water management that minimises health risk is another key consideration.

Local/State Government Reform

14. In the interests of consistency, will you support the State funding of Local Government Elections under a similar model to that of the State Elections?

The last council election processes were a deterrent to effective democratic participation. As a member of a grassroots political party I am aware that the cost of that election was high.

In principle, I stand for encouraging political discourse and grass-roots democracy.

I would be pushing for Truth in political advertising, so that voters can re-establish trust in the information provided at elections. We need to return to productive political debate- we can all learn from each other, if we share the same basic truths.
